## Dear Parent/Carer

We would ask that you support our students to arrive on the School site in good time to begin their learning promptly.

## PUNCTUALITY

The great majority of students live within 1.5 miles of the School and are therefore able to walk or ride a bike. The School appreciates that traffic in the local area is heavy, however, it is predictable during the morning rush hour and students must account for this. The vast majority of our students could walk within thirty minutes.
Please re-inforce the importance of punctuality with your children and share the strategies below to ensure they arrive on time in the future:

- Set a louder alarm
- Go to bed earlier
- Leave 10-15 minutes earlier and aim to on site by 08:25
- Do not adopt the mind-set that the traffic will always be better today
- Buses are more likely to be fuller in wet weather - so allow yourself the opportunity of more than one bus and aim for 08:20
- Traffic is likely to increase as winter approaches - allow more time for hold-ups and delays

Late detentions of 30 -minutes are given to all students the day following late attendance. Those parents whose child collects siblings from a Primary School will need to make alternative arrangements on these days.

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## ATTENDANCE

Children must, by law, attend school regularly. Regular attendance is important, not just because the law requires it but because it is the best way of ensuring that a child makes the most of the educational opportunities which are available to them. Low levels of attendance can lead to prosecution by the Local Authority. With your support, the School will ensure that all our students stay safe and achieve.

Students are expected to attend school every day, unless they are ill or if there is an exceptional circumstance. Doctor's/dentist appointment should be arranged outside of school hours. Additionally, the legal entitlement for religious festivals is only 3 days throughout the academic year - these are still recorded as absences.
If parents are planning to arrange term-time leave for students, they must:

- complete the application form on the website
- arrange a meeting with the School before travelling

Whilst the School can rarely authorise such absences, it can ensure you are provided with all the necessary information that impacts your child's education.
